

After several years working predominantly nights in theatre Amanda looked for a new challenge and came to work in the Gynaecology Emergency Department (GED). She undertook the new role with enthusiasm and when the opportunity arose, she applied to become part of the Early Pregnancy Assessment Unit (EPAU) team she put herself forward.

The EPAU care for women with complications in earl pregnancy between 6 and 12 weeks. It is a self contained unit that works closely with the GED and is led by myself as lead for EAPU. To become an EPAU nurse sonographer Amanda had to undertake a postgraduate qualification in ultrasound scanning. This demonstrates learning to the level of a masters. Amanda passed the course with flying colours and became a fully fledged member of the team.

Alongside the ultrasound training Amanda worked within the department and developed her understanding on the complex needs of our women in EPAU. She spent time visiting Honeysuckle to understand the bereavement pathways and developed her communication and breaking bad news skills.

Amanda qualified as a nurse ultrasonographer in Spring 2020 which coincided with the start of the pandemic.

The team in EPAU was severely affected by this with two of the three senior members being required to shield. This meant that Amanda had to take on a lot of responsibility early on in her scanning career. Although there were difficult times Amanda managed these with dignity and continued hard work. She worked with the ultrasonogphers and consultants within gynaecology and developed her skills further.

Scanning in early pregnancy requires real-time interpretation and discussion with the woman and her loved ones regarding the outcome of the scan. This can be a highly emotional situation that requires great empathy and compassion. These are skills that Amanda has developed through her time working within EPAU. She is gentle and kind hearted as demonstrated through feedback she has received from couples even when they have received the worst news they could imagine.

Amanda is committed to the development of the service. Scanning is only half of the role we undertake in EPAU. Recognition of the heartbreak people who access our service undergo is vital. Amanda developed a system to call women back after their diagnosis of miscarriage to enable them to discuss management options when they felt ready rather than rely on the woman calling back or relying completely on the busy team from the GED calling the following day.

Amanda and the team are undertaking consent training to improve the experience of women who suffer miscarriage that require medical or surgical management. This will enable the nursing staff to initiate or complete the consent process within the EPAU sparing the woman a further wait to see a medic to obtain consent. This will improve not only the care of our women but also women in the GED who are in need of the GED team.

Happily, Amanda had her own pregnancy in 2021 and has a beautiful daughter Nelly who I had the honour of bringing into the world. Since returning to work she balances being a fulltime mother and a dedicated EPAU nurse. She continues to drive to service forward and is invested in being part of the new vision for early pregnancy care at LWH that will make us leaders in women's health.

#### **Hewitt Fertility Research Projects**

Five members of our Hewitt Reproductive Science and Nursing team recently presented their research to fertility professionals from around the UK, showcasing their amazing work which is already having a positive impact on successful treatment outcomes for Hewitt patients.

Clinical Andrologist Tamanda Timvere presented 'Can the introduction of automation in therapeutic sperm preparation improve embryologists semen analysis performance?' A fantastic presentation that was awarded the Jean Purdy prize at the conference in Belfast. What a team!

#### Other presentations included:

- Clinical Embryologist Bethany Muller presented
   'Does number of sperm added at in vitro fertilisation insemination impact the rate of normal and abnormal fertilisation events?
- Lead Clinical Embryologist Hannah Newby presented 'In the absence of personalised progesterone testing, implementation rates in medical frozen embryo transfers are improved with a combination of subcutaneous and pessary luteal progesterone support'.
- Fertility Nurse Specialist Lois Whelan presented 'What is the psychological impact of imposing the one at a time embryo transfer policy for women?'.
- Clinical Andrologist Olivia Sandys presented on 'Optimising the alkalinisation protocol for patients with retrograde ejaculation'.
