Liverpool Women's and Liverpool University Hospitals appoint joint Chair

David Flory CBE has been appointed as joint Chair of Liverpool University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust (LUHFT) and Liverpool Women's NHS Foundation Trust. He will start this joint role in March 2024.

The two Trusts have a history of working in partnership and collaboration, and the joint Chair role is designed to build on this foundation.

David was previously appointed to Chair LUHFT for a 12-month term starting in February 2023. Robert Clarke, the current chair of Liverpool Women's, has announced that he will be stepping down from his role at the end of February, having served the maximum eight-year term of office. David has a track record of delivering healthcare services and brings experience and understanding of the population health needs across Liverpool City Region.

Commenting on his appointment, David said: "I am delighted that I am able to continue working with the fantastic teams at LUHFT and I look forward to joining colleagues at Liverpool Women's where there are so many opportunities to make a real difference to the communities we serve."

James Sumner, Chief Executive of LUHFT and Chief Executive of Liverpool Women's, said: "David's extensive skills, knowledge and experience of the NHS, and understanding of healthcare in the Liverpool City Region, are a huge asset and his appointment is fantastic news for our patients and our staff."

Raj Jain, Chair of NHS Cheshire and Merseyside, said: "I am delighted with the appointment of David Flory as Chair of both Liverpool University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust and Liverpool Women's NHS Foundation Trust. This appointment reflects increasingly close working between the Trusts – for the benefit of local patients – following the recent appointment of James Sumner as joint Chief Executive."

While this is a joint role, the Trusts will continue to operate as separate and independent organisations. Each Trust will continue to have its own Board of Directors and Council of Governors, which will be managed and operate as individual Trusts.

David is Chair of NHS Lancashire and South Cumbria Integrated Care Board and previously held the role of interim Independent Chair for Cheshire and Merseyside Health and Care Partnership until March 2022.

Prior to this David had 22 years' board-level experience as Chief Executive and Executive Director of NHS organisations in England.

Liverpool Women's fertility centre becomes first in UK to offer state-of-the-art technology for managing frozen eggs and embryos

TMRW Life Sciences, a fertility technology company automating the IVF lab, today announced its global expansion with the adoption of its technology in the UK.

The Hewitt Fertility Centre, will become the first clinic outside of the United States to adopt TMRW Life Sciences' CryoRobot Select (CRS), an automated platform for the safe management and storage of frozen eggs and embryos.

Thanks to advances in assisted reproductive technology, more people are building families and storing frozen eggs and embryos – often for decades. The UK's Health Strategy is making sure that this growth is inclusive, and the government's decision in 2022 to increase storage time limits for frozen eggs and embryos from 10 years to 55 years was an important response. But both efforts are overwhelming the legacy, manual storage systems and laborious hand-labelled identification methods that fertility clinics have relied upon for decades.

Dr Rachel Gregoire, Scientific Director/HFEA Person Responsible of The Hewitt Fertility Centres said:

"I am delighted for our patients and for the scientific team that we can finally announce the introduction of the CRS into our clinical pathways. It is a credit to Rebecca Lunt, Lead Clinical Embryologist and the team who have worked tirelessly with the incredible people at TMRW to make this happen. Almost three years ago the Hewitt Fertility Centre demonstrated that manual cryostorage involves potential unnecessary handling events of patient samples in storage, and we are so pleased to be the first fertility clinic outside of the USA to offer this innovative CE Marked technology for our patients. We all wish to thank Liverpool Women's NHS Foundation Trust for listening to us and for investing in this technology so that the Hewitt Fertility Centres can continue to be leaders in offering safe and innovative fertility treatments."

Over the last three years, the Hewitt Fertility Centre has completed in-depth studies to quantify the potential hazards associated with manual cryostorage of eggs and embryos following fertility treatment. The studies' findings show that there continues to be risks associated with manual cryostorage for in vitro fertilisation (IVF), even when clinics use radio frequency identification (RFID) witnessing technology and with well-established standard operating procedures to reduce risk.

Rebecca Lunt, Lead Clinical Embryologist said:

"Here at the Hewitt Fertility Centre the team are over the moon to introduce the TMRW CRS into clinical use for our patients. After several years of working with TMRW to help reduce unnecessary risk in the cryolaboratory for both staff and patient samples, we are excited that this amazing technology is here and we can offer state-of-the-art storage to Hewitt Fertility patients who opt to use it. This has been a real team effort, with the team in Hewitt working closely with TMRW's fantastic team, but also a big thanks to Liverpool Women's NHS Foundation Trust for being dedicated to patient safety and investing in this technology."

TMRW's CRS is an automated platform that combines proprietary, state-of-the-art hardware and software to safely track, monitor and store frozen eggs and embryos. For the first time in the United Kingdom, frozen specimens can now be digitally identified and tracked, safely managed with automated robotics, and remotely monitored around the clock. The CRS helps reduce potential points of failure by 94% compared to manual specimen management and storage systems, and it helps fertility clinics safely scale to meet growing patient demand.

"Our partnership with The Hewitt Fertility Centre represents the first step in our global expansion and illustrates our commitment to raising the global standard of care," said Louis Villalba, Chief Executive Officer at TMRW. "We applaud The Hewitt Fertility Centre for being the first IVF clinic outside of the United States to adopt our CE Marked and FDA Cleared specimen management system. Our collaboration heralds a new era of safety and precision in managing frozen eggs and embryos in the UK."

TMRW received a CE Mark for the CryoRobot Select in September, enabling commercialization across the UK and Europe. To earn the certification, the CRS was developed with state-of-the-art standards and met rigorous clinical safety and efficacy requirements established by European Medical Device Regulations. Along with an earlier clearance by the Food and Drug Administration, the European approval makes TMRW's robotic systems a new global standard.

Flagship Liverpool birth cohort study aiming to improve health outcomes opens for recruitment

A major birth cohort study tracing the lives of 10,000 Liverpool families to enable researchers, clinicians and policymakers to understand more about complex health issues opened on 25 April.

Children Growing Up in Liverpool (C-GULL) is the first large scale birth cohort study in the Liverpool City Region, and will track 10,000 first born babies and their families from early in pregnancy through childhood and beyond.

Researchers will collect information on their biological, physical, and mental health, as well as the home environment and more. This innovative study will use the latest data collection methods to give a comprehensive picture of the early life origins of health and wellbeing. This information will be used to inform policies and practices that promote the health and well-being of families in Liverpool and beyond.

C-GULL is a partnership between the University of Liverpool, the Wellcome Trust, Liverpool Women's Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority and Liverpool City Council. The study is delivered in collaboration with the NIHR Clinical Research Network North West Coast.

James Sumner, CEO of Liverpool Women's Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, said: "We're thrilled to be a part of this important study that will benefit families in our community and beyond. C-GULL will provide valuable insights into the early life origins of health and wellbeing and help us create a better future for our children."





Professor Louise Kenny, Lead Investigator, said: "C-GULL is an exciting opportunity to make a real impact on the health of future generations. By tracking families from pregnancy through childhood, we can gain a deeper understanding of the complex factors that shape health outcomes."

Professor Tim Jones, Vice Chancellor of the University of Liverpool said: "C-GULL will be an important resource for health researchers locally, nationally and internationally for decades to come and the University of Liverpool is delighted and proud to partner in this pioneering study."

C-GULL will be nested within a population-wide, civic data linkage platform. The study will collect extensive biological, biometric, socio-demographic and psychosocial information at two time points antenatally (12-16 weeks gestational age and 32-36 weeks gestational age), at birth, and when the child is aged three, 12 and 24 months.

Women are eligible to take part in the study if this is their first ongoing pregnancy, their pregnancy is in the first 12-16 weeks, they are aged 16 years and older and they have booked for their maternity care to be provided by Liverpool Women's Hospital.

Parents who participate in C-GULL will receive additional health checks and support for themselves and their child during pregnancy and childhood.

Professor Enitan Carroll, Clinical Director, NIHR Clinical Research Network: North West Coast said: "Research from the Department of Public Health and Policy has highlighted an alarming rise in health inequalities and infant mortality across Liverpool City Region. We must act now to find a research solution to reverse this worrying trend. The NIHR Clinical Research Network: North West Coast is proud to provide support for an ambitious and collaborative study that will follow 10,000 children born in Liverpool, and bring together researchers and healthcare staff to understand how we can provide a healthier start for our children born in the city. C-GULL will allow future generations to realise their potential, free from the burden that health inequality brings."

The C-GULL Study is funded through a Wellcome Trust Longitudinal and Population Study Award, with enhancement funding provided by matched funding from the University of Liverpool. The civic-owned data resource is supported by the Civic Data Co-operative. Interviewees available include researchers, midwives, senior leaders from partner organisations and study participants.

Liverpool Women's boasts zero vacancies in maternity services despite national shortage

Liverpool Women's is one of a small number of Trusts throughout the country currently carrying no vacancies within their maternity services department.

Despite a national shortage of midwives, Liverpool Women's NHS Foundation Trust is currently carrying no vacancies and are confidently retaining their existing workforce. By actively encouraging and supporting retired employees to return to work offering flexible working and a free breakfast and parking for all student midwives, the Trust is thriving.

The Trust is also offering an award-winning Preceptorship Programme for newly qualified Midwives that is seeing an outstanding 98% retention rate. The programme, now in it's 3rd year, was developed by a multidisciplinary team within the Maternity department and provides support and development for newly qualified Midwives. The programme has been a huge success and commended nationally, with the most recent accolade coming from the Nursing Times Workforce Awards.

The scheme scooped 'Preceptorship Programme of the Year' at the 2023 Awards. The judges felt the programme was an "outstanding and inspiring submission, showcasing passion, insight and innovative practice with strong aims and a desire to support a growing practice".

Dianne Brown, Chief Nurse commended the Deputy Head of Midwifery Alison Murray, and the education team at the Trust on their national recognition commenting: "we are absolutely thrilled with this award which acknowledges the multidisciplinary team approach within our Maternity service and for making the vision we had for midwifery preceptorship come to life. We are proud that we have a team of leaders who are supporting and inspiring the next generation of newly qualified midwives at Liverpool Women's and for the benefit of the wider NHS in the future."

The Trust is also seeing low levels of Staff turnover rates (6.1%) below the national target) indicating a stable midwifery workforce.

Yana Richens, Director of Midwifery and Heledd Jones, Head of Midwifery at Liverpool Women's said: "We pride ourselves on developing our workforce here at Liverpool Women's, and we have introduced several new posts in the midwifery structure during the past 12 months. These include Maternal Medicine Specialist Midwife, Diabetes Specialist Midwife, Clinical Lead Midwife for the Midwifery Led Unit and Clinical Lead Midwife for the Fetal Medicine Unit to name but a few. We feel these additional posts are having a positive impact throughout maternity, and our commitment to excellence continues to strengthen our team and enhance the care we provide"
